Foreword from the AIFST President and Board Chair



Whilst the pandemic is ostensibly behind us, both global and local markets remain unsettled. Increasing costs and tightening supply chains continue to place pressure on the agri-food sector. In response, the agri-food sector must continue to innovate to grow and remain competitive in a challenging environment. In the face of this uncertainty the AIFST continues to advance and inspire all food sector professionals through education, collaboration, and recognition to champion a robust, innovative science based Australian food industry to meet future food needs. Formed in 1967 and now well over half a century young, the AIFST continues to advocate for food technology and the agri-food sector. In response to you, our members, 2023 has seen the AIFST continue to provide a range of both in person and online events to foster continuous professional development across both technical and vocational areas. In this year alone with the help of

our state branches and dedicated speakers and presenters we have delivered 60 events totalling 114 CPD hours to nearly 4800 attendees. A highlight of the year was the convention. Held at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre with the theme "The Science of Food - Security and Sustainability" the event brought together both local and international speakers on a range of topics from "Plants for space and sustainability on earth" to "Sustainable packaging design". I want to take this opportunity to recognise the invaluable work of the organising committee and the students and volunteers who helped ensure the event went smoothly. The ongoing growth and development of our members is a key pillar of our vision and purpose.

In 2023 we once again saw the completion of a successful mentor program. Students, graduates, and early career professionals have the opportunity through this program to develop and learn from seasoned professionals in the agri-food space. This year 100 members participated in the programme, and I want to sincerely thank the mentors for the time and commitment in supporting this important initiative and the mentees for engaging with passion and enthusiasm in the programme.

AIFST continues to advocate for the industry and this year prepared several submissions to government enquiries and food standards development. Not least of which was the submission on Food Security in Australia. Pleasingly our recommendations for a National Food Plan overseen by a Federal Minister for Food were embraced by the report which has now gone to the Office of Prime Minister and Cabinet. We see significant benefit for the agri-food sector in a Minister for Food that is responsible for the sector as a whole rather than the current dispersed nature of food policy which is spread across a number of portfolios including industry, health, and agriculture.

2023 also saw the launch of the membership directory allowing our members to better connect, share insights and knowledge with peers and colleagues across the sector. Our special interest groups also offer members the opportunity to stay connected in shared areas of interest including on Food Policy and Regulation, Sensory and Consumer Science, Food Microbiology and Consultants.



In 2023 we saw three Board members rotate out of their positions and I thank Suz Allen, Deon Mahoney and John Kavanagh for their service to the Institute over the past 3 years. I also thank Duncan McDonald who retired last year for his service over a number of years as President of the organisation. With these departures we welcomed Heather Haines, Marc Barnes, and Gregory Harper. Their skills and knowledge are invaluable to the organisation and the Board has welcomed their insights and commitment to the organisation and the agri-food sector.

Our CEO, Fiona Fleming and her team continue to deliver a tightly run organisation to ensure ongoing delivery of engaging events and services to all our members. Over the past year we also welcomed the appointment of Melissa Garland to the secretariat as Education and Events Manager. This has resulted in an increased focus on technical events further increasing our reach and contribution to continuing professional development.

Looking to the future, a vibrant and strong AIFST is contingent on the support and engagement of our members. I encourage all members to be involved in our programs and contribute your suggestions for our future. We are keen to hear your ideas on improvements and opportunities for our institute members to 'grow, learn, connect and champion' so please reach out to myself or Fiona. Chief Executive Officer's Report – the Year in Review

This report reflects our achievements in 2023 and reminds us never to underestimate the resilience and determination of the food science community and the broader food industry.









AIFST Strategic Plan and Priorities

In 2023, the AIFST continued to unite food industry professionals in the science of feeding our future by focusing on four key strategic priorities (long term objectives):

- Grow personal development, mentoring and peer recognition to grow the next generation of food scientists and technologists.
- Learn learn and share knowledge about food systems, advances in food science and technology. Promote Continuing Professional Development (CPD) for all members.
- Connect connecting like-minded members with industry networks; leveraging relationships and enabling collaboration that is relevant and engaging.
- Champion the leading voice for food science and food scientists within industry, academia, government, and key opinion leaders, to grow respect and recognition for the profession.





The short-term priorities for 2023, as set out in the Strategic Plan were:

- Broaden membership scope and strengthen engagement
- Diversify AIFST revenue streams to ensure greater financial stability
- Develop education and career pathway products and services
- Strengthen school and tertiary relationships to influence education curriculums to build a food science pipeline
- Build strategic partnerships for scale and long-term viability, and
- Communicate the role and importance of food science professionals in feeding Australians in the future





The AIFST strives to develop member capabilities, grow its community of members and strategic partners and ensure the AIFST remains financially secure and always responsive and relevant to its stakeholders

Membership

At the end of 2023 AIFST had a total of 1,615 members. This was a 3% increase from the membership at the end of 2022 of 1,566. The Board and team continued its focus on strategies to demonstrate membership value to attract new members and bring back previous members to AIFST. The modest increase in membership is reflective of the current economic climate.

Membership Engagement and Development Committee

The Membership Engagement & Development Committee (MEDC) continued to meet into 2023 under the leadership of Stewart Eddie and supported by Board Member Suzanne Allen.

Its purpose is to provide advice and recommend strategies on member communication and engagement to enhance the overall membership benefits, to attract new members, and retain existing ones.

In 2023 AIFST introduced two member initiatives:

1) New member orientation webinars were launched

Designed to welcome new members and provide an introduction on how best to get an enriching and rewarding experience from their membership. The webinars are an informative session, walking through key benefits and a virtual tour of the AIFST website and the many member resources.



2) The AIFST Member Directory was launched.

The member directory was launched as a new feature on the AIFST website. As part of the Institute's ongoing efforts to enhance members experience and foster greater connectivity the members only directory will allow members to connect and collaborate directly. Within the directory a member's name, current workplace and



member type are displayed. Members can then reach out to each other via a 'send message' option within the directory.

AIFST 2023 Fellows

In 2023 the AIFST welcomed four new Fellows.

A Fellow of AIFST is the highest level of our membership and is reserved for members who have dedicated themselves to the advancement of the food industry and of the Institute. The AIFST recognised Dr Mike Patane, Dr Yasmina Sultanbawa, Wendy Jarvis and Andrea Currie.

Mentoring Program

The AIFST mentoring program is an annual, six-month program that aims to bring young professionals and experienced members of AIFST together. Mentees and mentors are paired based on experience and interest and encouraged to meet on a weekly or fortnightly basis depending on their individual availability.

The 2023 AIFST mentoring program launched in April and concluded in October, with 50 pairs successfully completing the course program. We were delighted to open the mentee applications beyond students and graduates this year and included a host of young professional members in the early stages of their careers.

In 2023 AIFST continued with the successful mentee interview process which enables greater reliability in the pairing process. The interview process involved allocating each mentee, who applied for the program via written application, a 10-minute time slot in which we arranged for past mentors of the program to ask simple questions about their interests and goals for the program. From here, we were able to pair mentees and mentors accordingly. AIFST would like to thank all mentors who volunteered their time to help with this process as it continues to add ongoing significant value to the program. Another proven element of the mentoring program which contributes to its success was the establishment of mentoring catch ups. Once a month, a mentoring catch-up with the entire participating cohort took place providing an opportunity for AIFST to connect with the members and allow the mentors and mentees of other pairs to network, get to know each other and share valuable insights about the program.



The program, once again, received great feedback from both mentees and mentors. Melissa Garland, Education and Events Manager worked hard during the year to ensure the success of the program and on behalf of the mentees and mentors, we thank her!



Australian Food Safety Auditor Development Program (AFSADP)

With the generous support of a grant from the NSW Food Authority the AIFST and industry partners collaborated on the development of the Food Safety Auditor Intern program. The initiative aims to address the serious and increasing challenge of availability and competency of food safety auditors across all food categories in Australia.

The project commenced in July 2022 with the support and involvement of food businesses and certification bodies and significant progress was made during 2023. AIFST contracted Bill McBride of Foodlink EFBR as the project manager. The need for a systemic approach to developing an auditor pipeline in Australia is paramount. AIFST engaged with Australian food retailers, food service providers, food manufacturers, primary producers, regulators, tertiary and VET institutions, and certification bodies (CBs) to progress this project.

Remote Steering Committee meetings were conducted monthly or more frequently if required and chaired by Fiona Fleming, CEO of AIFST and Bill McBride, AFSADP project manager.

Project Objectives

- 1. Establishment of a food safety auditing career path, tested and supported by food science /food technology students, universities/VET sector and industry.
- 2. Incorporation of contemporary auditing practices, including soft (behavioural) skills, virtual technology and AI, data analytics for a robust food safety auditing career path.
- 3. Food science/technology universities and/or VET sector incorporate education in food safety auditing in their curricula.
- 4. Industry internship established to provide practical industry experience for new auditors on food safety auditing career path.
- 5. The food safety auditing career path is aligned with GFSI auditor competence initiatives (Professional Recognition Bodies) and other emerging international food safety auditor initiatives.
- 6. A certification industry promotional campaign is established to attract young food industry professionals to food safety auditing.

The opportunity is to develop a pathway for new auditors (new or recent graduates) to take up a career in food safety auditing. The need exists (declining and aging auditor cohort), and the current development processes are cumbersome, expensive and restrictive for both aspiring auditors and certification bodies.

The planned intern pilots are intended to establish a prototype for a streamlined career pathway that is based on the foundation of GFSI and certification owner qualifications, and industry expectations.

AIFST continues its collaboration with all stakeholders on the Australian Food Safety Auditor Development program. It is committed to establishing this exciting pathway for the advancement of food safety auditing as a preferred career for professionals in the Australian food industry.







AIFST is leading the development of food science and technology professionals, by actively supporting career development, shaping education pathways and industry participation

The AIFST Continuing Professional Development Program (CPD) continued in 2023 delivering 114 hours of CPD to members. This program is a self-planned, structured program for developing professional skills. The program is designed with clear objectives; requires active participation; extends professional knowledge and capabilities and allows members to engage in a broad range of activities which will increase career options.



The voluntary program is designed to encourage members to maintain the currency of skills and knowledge, will provide recognition of experience and interests and align food scientists

with other well-respected professions. The CPD program is intended to provide recognition of these activities and skills by formalising and recording the process in a straightforward and transportable way.

The competence of members is vital to the development and credibility of food science practitioners and a CPD program allows a formalised documentation of skills and reflects the professionalism of the members.

Food Science Fundamentals Course

In 2023 the AIFST launched the Food Science Fundamentals course. A virtual course, with the aim of familiarising all staff working in the food industry on the basic principles and language of food science.

Held over four afternoon sessions, participants gain a broad-based understanding to assist in communication with other staff and customers. They also learn how food science impacts and supports their non-science role.

The course content includes:

- What is Food Science?
- Food Policy & Regulations
- Food Chemistry the building blocks
- Food Packaging
- Food Microbiology
- Nutrition food and the human body
- Food Processing
- Sensory & Consumer Science
- Food Safety
- The Future of Food

The course was well received and attended and will continue to be offered to members throughout 2024.

food australia

In 2023, four issues of *food australia* were published with content provided by a range of contributors. Just over 1,400 copies per edition were distributed to members and subscribers in both print and electronic form.











The four editions featured 113 contributed articles and 63 contributors. We recorded a growing number of reads 2,500 in 2023 up from 2,000 in 2022, and 7,000 impressions on our digital platform.

Food Tech Bites



FoodTech Bites continued in 2023, delivering up-to-date technical content on a range of news and published research on food science related topics to members.

Eleven issues were distributed to members and continues to drive good engagement.

The average open rate for Food Tech Bites in 2023 was **49.7** %. This is an extremely good open rate.

According to Campaign Monitor 2022 Email Marketing Benchmarks Report, the average email open rate was **21.5%**, across all industries. The industries with the highest open rates, like Education, Agriculture, and Financial Services, average between 25-28%.

Food Microbiology conference – 30 March 2023



AIFST ILSI Dr David Roberts Emerging Young Leader Award

This award was created last year in memory of Dr David (Dave) Roberts as a means of encouraging and supporting the development of a young food scientist, technologist or nutritionist for their endeavour or achievement and leadership potential, within the food industry. Dr David Roberts was a nutrition scientist who made significant contributions to teaching and research at the University of Sydney, the University of Newcastle, and at Food Standards Australia New Zealand, the Australian Food and Grocery Council and ILSI SEAR, Australasia. 

Government Relations

Science Meets Parliament

The AIFST was represented at Science Meets Parliament 2023 annual event in Canberra. This event brought together scientist, scientific societies, government, industry, and the broader community providing opportunities to elevate the visibility and understanding of STEM in Parliament and Australian Government Departments. It was an important opportunity for the AIFST to build upon its advocacy work for food science professionals and investing in food science in the agri-food sector.

CEO Fiona Fleming had the opportunity to meet with Senator Jana Stewart and talk about the importance of food science and food scientists.







House of Representatives Standing Committee on Food Security

The AIFST welcomed the Inquiry Report from the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Agriculture into food security in Australia – *Australian Food Story: Feeding the Nation and Beyond.*

The inquiry's remit was to look at strengthening and safeguarding food security in Australia. The Committee, chaired by Labour MP Meryl Swanson, made 35 recommendations overall.

The primary recommendation is the development of a comprehensive National Food Plan providing for the food security, including nutritional security, of the nation and its people. The National Food Plan must have clear objectives and measurable targets set out in regular updates and action plans, and subject to regular review.

Further to the establishment of a National Food Plan, the Committee recommended the Australian Government appoint a Minister for Food, within the portfolio of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, with responsibility for the development and implementation of the National Food Plan, regular monitoring and updating of the plan, and accountability for achieving outcomes and targets under the plan.

AIFST had previously provided a submission to the Inquiry in December 2022 and AIFST CEO, Fiona Fleming and Dr Michael Depalo testified at a public hearing in June 2023. In December, AIFST CEO, Fiona Fleming, attended a virtual Q & A with the Committee Chair, Meryl Swanson, to gain further insight into next steps. AIFST looks forward to the opportunity to support the progression of the recommendations in 2024 and beyond. The full Inquiry report can be accessed on the AIFST website.

Submissions

In addition to representation on industry committees, the AIFST made several submissions on a range of food policy and regulation matters to regulatory consultations in 2023. The submissions are available on the <u>AIFST website</u>.

Supporting the Career Pathway Evaluation of core competencies for food science graduates



AIFST conducted an industry survey (July 2022) to gain an understanding of the core competencies that the food industry value of food science and technology graduates from Australian Universities and TAFE.

The survey was built from the graduate criteria identified by the Institute of Food Technologists (IFT) with additional attributes tailoring the survey to the Australian food industry.



The results of this survey were invaluable in 2023 providing a clear understanding of what competencies the Australian food industry value in food science and technology graduates. The AIFST continued its work with higher education institutions to ensure they deliver industry ready graduates for the industry.

AIFST State Branches Career Events

The AIFST State Branches hosted careers evenings in 2023, providing attendees with a unique opportunity to hear from industry experts about their journey in food science, from working in academia to actively supporting food product development.

The evenings were aimed at students studying Food Science, professionals looking to move into food science and technology through to entrepreneurs looking at pathways to innovate new food products.

All career evenings provided a valuable opportunity for the Branches to champion the industry to attendees and to give them the ability to connect with their Branch's food science and technology network.
